## PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND CLAUSEWITZ: ON WAR

**PURPOSE:** Propose framework for professional development sessions centering around Clausewitz's On War

## **DESCRIPTION:**

- Conduct an eight-series brown bag session on Clausewitz beginning September 25, 2015 and concluding on December 11, 2015 in room 3D1063.

- Invite subject matter experts to each brown bag session.
- Once invitation to speak is accepted, Personnel & Readiness will work with subject matter experts to narrow down key passages and discussion points for dissemination to attendees. Additionally, dates and times will be locked in, based on calendar deconfliction.
